Why Are Soup Kitchens Needed



Did you know that 33.6% of Saginaw residents have incomes less than the national poverty level? For many this is not by choice, such as from losing a job, or being a "starving college student". Also, bills such as medical and car repair can make it difficult to cover monthly costs, such as rent, utilities, clothing and food. Finally, retirement benefits such as social security, might not cover these cost of living expenses. Soup Kitchens help not only the homeless, they help those struggling financially. At ESSK, we want to lower the burden of a person wondering where and when their next meal could come from.

More Than Just Food

Yes, East Side Soup Kitchen provides food to those in need. Also, with our partners, we provide medical and dental assistance. But probably most important, is that ESSK lets peple know that they are not alone with the hardships that they might be facing. We provide a place for people to relax, be respected and to not be judged.

Hardships can affect anyone, no matter their ethnicity, income or social status. ESSK is not just a community service, we are a family that looks out for each other.
